Attendance Requirements

It is important for every student in Ohio to attend school every day. Missing too much school has long-term, negative effects on students, such as lower achievement and graduation rates. There are many reasons students miss school, but districts often can directly impact their students' attendance. By using data to identify and support students who may need extra support and services, districts can target supports to get students to school every day. Because of the requirements of House Bill 410 it is **extremely important that you keep your contact information (address / phone number) up-to-date with the CTC.** The Pike County CTC will make attempts to contact you when required by House Bill 410 to update you on your child's attendance.

Regular school attendance is an important ingredient in students' academic success. Excessive absences interfere with students' progress in mastering knowledge and skills necessary to graduate from high school and be prepared for higher education and the workforce. To support academic success for all students, the district will partner with students and their families to identify and reduce barriers to regular school attendance. The district will utilize a continuum of strategies to reduce student absence including, but not limited to:

Notification of student absence to the parent or guardian;

Development and implementation of an absence intervention plan, which may include supportive services for students and families;

Counseling:

Parent education and parenting programs;

Mediation;

Intervention programs available through juvenile authorities; and

Referral for truancy, if applicable.

DEFINITION OF TRUANCY AND EXCESSIVE ABSENCES

- 1. Definition of 'habitual truant' changed from days to hours. The new definition is:
 - a. Absent 30 or more consecutive hours without a legitimate excuse;
 - b. Absent 42 or more hours in one school month without a legitimate excuse; or



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- c. Absent 72 or more hours in one school year without a legitimate excuse.
- 2. Definition of 'excessive absences':
 - a. Absent 38 or more hours in one school month with or without a legitimate excuse; or
 - b. Absent 65 or more hours in one school year with or without a legitimate excuse.

DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES WHEN A CHILD HAS EXCESSIVE ABSENCES

When a student is excessively absent from school, the following will occur:

- 1. The district will notify the student's parents in writing within 7 days of the triggering absence;
- 2. The student will follow the district's policy for addressing excessive absences; and
- 3. The district may refer the student and family to community resources as appropriate.

DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES WHEN A CHILD IS HABITUALLY TRUANT

When a student is habitually truant, the following will occur:

- 1. Within 7 school days of the triggering absence, the district will do the following:
 - a. Select members of the absence intervention team;
 - b. Make 3 meaningful attempts to secure the participation of the student's parent or guardian on the absence intervention team.
- 2. Within 10 days of the triggering absence, the student will be assigned to the selected absence intervention team;
- 3. Within 14 school days after the assignment of the team, the district will develop the student's absence intervention plan; and
- 4. If the student does not make progress on the plan within 61 days or continues to be excessively absent, the district will file a complaint in the juvenile court.
